Dog Sledding & Biboon Event



This winter, Waking Up Ojibwe Anishinaabemodaa hosted two incredible land-based and cultural events that brought together over 175 participants. On January 29th, more than 75 families joined us at the Nordic ski trails for a bush-style dogsledding experience, enjoying 1.2 km rides through the snow-covered trails. Families also warmed up in the chalet with cedar tea, language games, a fire, and traditional activities like popping wild rice and snowshoeing.

Then on February 22nd, we welcomed nearly 100 attendees for a full-day Biboon gathering that featured dogsledding, ski waxing, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing, along with yummy foods like wild rice soup, bannock, and frybread. Indoor language-based games, beaver and rabbit skinning demonstrations, and teachings with elders Don Jones and Dwayne Johnson—plus legends shared by Jason Jones—rounded out the day. Miigwech to our community partners United Native Friendship Centre, Gizhewaadiziwin Health Access Centre, Weechitiwin, and the Anishinaabemowini-ogichitaag class for supporting and volunteering at these beautiful winter events!















What's New?

The Winter-Spring 2025 **Azhemiinigoziwin** cohort participated in weekly language classes with Waabishkiginew-Shaelyn Jordan that were aimed at providing a foundational introduction to Anishinaabemowin. The curriculum emphasized practical conversational use of the language, and was encouraging of consistent participation and peer support.

Waking Up Ojibwe celebrated **National Indigenous Languages Day**with a week of events at the Rainy Lake Campus in late
March. The week included an Anishinaabemowin Star Wars viewing, Bingo and other games, tobacco pouch making, medicine teachings, and more.

On April 15th, 2025 the IT Dept and Training Dept at SGEI began a ten week language learning program with Niigaanigaabawiik. This learning opportunity was created in response to many local organizations requesting virtual Professional Development for their staff during the pandemic. In these 10 sessions we aim to introduce learners to basic conversational Anishinaabemowin while also familiarizing them with the usage of nouns, verbs, and grammar patterns.

What's New?

The next Gigidiziiminaanig meeting will take place on May 29, 2025. This will be the first time a Gigidiziiminaanig meeting will be held in one of the 10 communities. It will be hosted at the roundhouse in Manidoo Bawitigong, Rainy River First Nations, at Kay-Nah-Chi-Wah-Nung. This meeting has been planned under the direction of the Gigidiziiminaanig to have a Spring and Fall meeting in one of the communities' each year going forward.

Our colleagues at MIIN have been awarded a prestigious Bush Foundation grant of \$8,200,000 to continue their important language revitalization work and continued support of language programs like ours. Our team is continually invited to their immersion and PD sessions.

Our four (4) week online immersion program **Daga** Anishinaabemodaa began on January 20th with 8 participants, 5 of whom are employees of SGEI. This program covers basic introductory conversational Anishinaabemowin with the help of Pebaamibines and his book "Daga Anishinaabemodaa". Learners are required to commit 1 hour every day to the online class and at least 1 hour of continued learning & practice on personal time.

Going forward, the name of the Anishinaabemowin Revitalization Program at Seven Generations

Education Institute has been changed to:

Anishinaabemowini-ogichitaag

This name has been guided and influenced by the late Richard Morrison, the words of the late Willie Wilson, and the writing of Dr. Giniwgiizhig decades ago. On the surface, this can be understood as Anishinaabe Language Warriors. A feast for the renaming occurred on January 31, 2025.

Other Highlights:

- On February 7-9, nine Anishinaabemodaa staff and fifteen Anishinaabemowini-ogichitaag students attended the Ojibwe Language Symposium in Fond du Lac, MN. Robert Horton and Jeremy Andy presented Anishinaabemowini-ogichitaag: Blending Philosophies and Methods to Build Speakers.
- Ice fishing was a definite highlight this winter!
- We held star and constellation teachings, including Anishinaabemowin terms and stories.
- The class helped facilitate Gagwe-gikendamawizin, supporting learners through interactive, language activities.
- Explored understandings of rock paintings.
- Couchiching First Nation invited our students to bring their puppets to visit on April 7th!
- The class concluded for the year on May 16, 2025, celebrating a season full of language, culture, and connection with a luncheon.

Niigaanendadaa

The Mentor Learner program has been renamed **Niigaanendadaa** (Let's Think Ahead), a name gifted by Rose Marie Tuesday. The program has undergone evaluation and improvements with input from instructors, past participants, and their families. A new virtual classroom has been launched on BrightSpace, and while applications for this cohort are now closed, recruitment of fluent Anishinaabemowin speakers to support learners and future programming is ongoing.

Four students are currently in Phase 1 of the program which began with a ceremony and orientation on February 3, 2025, led by Lorna Cochrane. They are working with instructor Brittnee Hunter and fluent speaker Pamela Johnson for 15 hours a week, and have already completed three units. Students also have regular in person activities throughout the school year and will be engaging in land-based learning during the summer months.

Phase 2 of the program is currently in development. A working group of fluent speakers and team members meet monthly to create resources, brainstorm ideas, and build relationships between learners and future mentors. Experienced speakers and learners have also been invited to share best practices to support this planning.
